School Name: Canyon Elementary School Year: 2021-2022

Program/Activity	Brief Explanation
Art Gallery	We will line our hallways with special pieces of art students complete during their weekly art class and it will be available for parents and guests to view during our week of parent conferences in March.
Fiesta Days Rodeo Reading Challenge	This is our 6th year participating and partnering with SF city and the Rodeo to encourage student reading. Each grade level has one boy and one girl win a set of rodeo tickets for all those who meet the challenge. In addition our top boy and girl receive a cowboy hat, pair of wranglers, and cowboy boots. This year we have all our students participating and look forward to another successful year.
Hall monitors	Students apply in May to be a Hall Monitor. These 5th graders arrive to school early (at 8:25), wear a yellow vest, and stand in assigned high traffic areas in the hallways to help students remember to walk in the hallways and head to class between 8:30 and 8:40.
Junior Achievement and BIZ Town	Financial literacy lessons are taught each 1st - 5th grade classroom (1st - 4th with volunteers and 5th from the classroom teacher). Students learn about wants and needs and basic finances aligning with their grade level social students curriculum. 5th graders culminate their learning and the experience with BIZ town, a chance to plan, organize and run a mini business for a day in SLC.
Lunch buddies	Each fifth grade student has the opportunity to serve as a lunch buddy for the students in the Essential Elements Class. Just as fifth graders take turns serving as lunch workers, a few students each day accompany EEC students to lunch, help encourage them while they eat and then play specifically with them during their lunch recess.
NOVA	Fifth grade students receive training from a local police officer using the NOVA curriculum (Nurturing youth to seek out positive Opportunities, internalize good Values, and to accept Accountability for their choices in life). Students receive once a week lessons for ten weeks and then "graduate" with knowledge relating to the Nova principles as well as a relationship with local law enforcement. https://novaprinciples.com/about-the-n-o-v-a-principles-foundation/

Peer Tutors	4th grade students could apply to be a peer tutor in our Essential Elements Class (EEC) with students who have special needs. The students miss one planning time class a week (not p.e.) to instead go to the EEC class and help students with the instead go to the EEC class and help students with the instead go.
PTA	instead go to the EEC class and help students with their academic learning and activities. We have a very supportive PTA here at Canyon who help organize and run the following events (among others): a themed Ribbon Week (Red-Healthy Choices, Green-Safety, White-technology safety), book fairs (books provided to library and classrooms); a schoolwide fundraiser (varies), Literacy Month, Teacher Appreciation week, Reflections contest, Dudes and Doughnuts, Art Gallery week and more. Each year they grant funds to our school that addresses a school need that we try to match with school and district funds to meet the designated school need.
RAD Kids	RAD Kids Personal Safety and empowerment is a program that has previously been done in 3rd grade for an hour a week per class. We have and maintain two RAD certified trainers, one parent and one school employee (our librarian). This year, 3rd (and 4th as well due to missing it last year with COVID restrictions) graders will be invited to participate (twice a week) during the month of June on a voluntary basis. School Choir	4th and 5th grade students can participate in our once a week, after school choir. Students do two performances for parents (one in December and one in May) as well as perform for students at the school and for other special occasions.
Service Learning	We look to provide service learning experiences for our students. Our student council helps arrange some annual school wide service activities each year. This past November, we completed our 9 th annual Food Drive where we partnered with Tabitha's Way, a local Utah food bank in our community and collected non-perishable items for families in need.
Student Council	We have student council applications, elections, and have 10 students serve each year. Mrs.Larsen and Ms. Beckham are our council advisors. The students attend a yearly conference at BYU, and help with spirit weeks, the food drive, assembly kick-offs, PTA events, and the book fair. They also help with daily announcements and model Canyon Track behaviors.

Safe Technology Utilization and Digital Citizenship in Public Schools HB213 Q&A for School Community Councils

What filters are being used in Nebo School District and how do they work?

Our web filtering device is called "ContentKeeper". It is a content filter that was chosen by our district in Summer 2016. Filtering works based on website classifications such as: entertainment, pornography, news, education, games, etc. Inappropriate keywords are also filtered for students/employees. We have a process for teachers to request specific websites to be "blocked" or "unblocked" for educational use by emailing webfilter@nebo.edu. Every request is addressed and responded to in a timely manner. Nebo works with ContentKeeper support to adjust settings when appropriate.

Are there different settings used for different grades and school levels?

We have three different filtering thresholds: default, students use and employee use. Default allows for any device to connect to our network during the school day (STU-OPEN) and doesn't require a password. This is strictly filtered. The student's filter is more restrictive and requires students to identify themselves by giving a username and password. Employees are filtered on a less restrictive basis so they are able to access all educational materials needed. Employees are also required to identify themselves. Chromebooks that are going home are also filtered by ContentKeeper on a student level.

What is the district policy on frequently used sites such as YouTube, Google Images, Weebly, and etc?

YouTube - student use is available in "restricted mode" (this blocks inappropriate videos, comments, and thumbnails); employees have full access to YouTube. Google Images - Students accessing Google Images will have inappropriate images blocked or "scrubbed" (not visible) Weebly - This is a website hosting service. We "whitelist" (open) specific teacher homepages for student use based on request from the teacher after we have reviewed the content. Other than these exceptions, weebly.com is blocked for inappropriate content.

Are there management systems available (MDM, Chrome management, LanSchool, and etc.) that can add additional control and who accesses those systems?

We utilize chrome management with our chromebooks. Some computer labs in schools have LanSchool installed on their PC's. LanSchool is a cost item and is a school based decision on purchasing. LanSchool allows monitoring of computer screens from a teacher or lab tech PC.

What resources does the district provide concerning educating students on safe internet use and digital citizenship?

We use NetSmartz and their presenters. They put on assemblies that are age appropriate. Schools are responsible for setting up these presentations or to come up with another alternative to educating their students. There are also separate presentations some schools/counselors do themselves from district resources. Health 2 classes also have an internet safety unit. Lab technicians and CTE teachers discuss net safety as well.

What is the protocol in the district schools when inappropriate content is accessed or attempted to access for students and employees?

ContentKeeper creates logs and reports that identify inappropriate use. School administrators are notified if a student or employee has attempted to access inappropriate web materials on a school computer. Reporting is available for investigations.

Explanation of district capabilities or inability to change filtering, settings and management tools based on best practices, technological limitations, and funding.

Where applicable, districts could include what is provided in connection with e-rate funding. We have the ability to change filtering rules or settings that are needed in the ever changing landscape of internet use. There are federal (CIPA) and state regulations that require filtering. We make a conscious effort to follow the law. Nebo School District utilizes the government e-rate funding program for internet connectivity needs. We have received back approximately 60% of qualified expenditures from our network and wireless upgrade projects.
